Pastor TaeWon: Are You With Me?

Christ is Risen!

Christ is Risen Indeed! Hallelujah!

hese three exclamations show us a traditional method in which believers celebrate Easter, the day of Jesus' resurrection. Easter is the day of victory in which the power of the love of God overcame the power of death. It is the **day of hope** in which despair is swept away by God creating everything new. Therefore, Easter is the day of a new beginning for every creature and the Universe by God the Creator, the Redeemer, and the Sustainer. On Easter, every believer shouts out together "Hallelujah" to God for all those reasons and more.

According to the Gospel of Mark, Jesus' resurrection is very powerfully expressed by three words: **"the empty tomb."** Externally, the empty tomb tells us the absence of Jesus' dead and buried body in the tomb. The stone, closing the tomb entrance, was rolled away, and the tomb was empty. Jesus was not found there

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anymore. However, the absence of Jesus' dead and buried body means that **death and its power were extinguished.** Therefore, it is natural to be aware that the presence of life and its power newly begins there. The empty tomb does not become the last place, meaning the end of life, but the new beginning place of life. It is a paradox of the empty tomb. The empty tomb is a metaphor and the decisive witness that Jesus is resurrected – He is alive.

The empty tomb, thus, tells us that Jesus is everywhere but the

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empty tomb. The first Easter people went to the tomb of Jesus. It was to honor Jesus' buried body there. They visited the last place of Jesus -where Jesus was buried. However, they did not stay there because they saw the empty tomb and they became aware of Jesus' resurrection. They looked at the **absence of death**. They saw that the power of death and despair had been finished already. They newly began their lives in and by the power of Jesus the Resurrected One. **They became the first Easter people**.

Siblings of the crucified and resurrected Jesus: let us newly begin from the empty tomb – its mystery and paradox. However, let us move on out of the empty tomb. Jesus is not there anymore, and he goes to people in need. Mark's Gospel tells us that the resurrected Jesus went to Galilee and also commanded his disciples to join, that is, follow him in Galilee. **Galilee means a symbolic space where Jesus is resurrected** among and for people in need. Every creature and the whole universe in need can be called a "Galilee." Jesus goes there and is/will be resurrected there. Jesus' command, going to Galilee, means that believers must join His resurrecting event. Where Jesus is resurrected, we must be also. It's why we believers are called the Easter people.

Therefore, if your heart and life are your Galilee, please go there with **hope in God**. Jesus is/will be resurrected in your heart and life. Also, if your family, friends, and neighbors are your Galilee, please go there. **Join Jesus' resurrection** there. Jesus will resurrect their lives. Let Jesus be resurrected in their hearts and lives. Friends, let us resurrect Jesus in our hearts and every heart.

Let us shout out: Christ is Risen! Christ is Risen, indeed! Hallelujah! Amen!

Financial Fraud Prevention

There's been an increase in imposter scams recently. Here's some tips on how these scams happen, and steps you can take to protect yourself.

An imposter scam is a fraudster impersonating a trusted individual, business, or organization trying to convince a target to transfer money.

Fraudsters will often:

- Contact you via a phone call, email, text, online advertisement, or social media post.
- Claim to be security or technical support for a known and reputable company, such as Microsoft, or a trusted financial institution like Schwab.
- Ask you to download software or request remote access to your computer.





Financial Fraud Prevention

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• Send you an email or text message with a link or attachment, which may ask you to approve or deny a transaction, set up new credentials, or take some other action regarding your account.

You can take some simple steps to combat this fraud:

- Confirm the legitimacy of the organization or person trying to reach you, especially if you did not initiate the contact.
- Do not assume you are speaking with an institution based on caller ID. Text messages, emails, and phone calls can appear to come from a trusted institution when they are actually from a fraudster.
- Use caution and take time to research if you receive a request to send money urgently.
- Check the URL (Internet address) of the website or link sent to you by email to validate it is a legitimate site address (e.g., www.schwab.com versus www.schwab.co).
- Report concerns you have. Check with your financial institution for the email address of their fraud prevention team, for example, phishing@schwab.com or reportabuse@navyfederal.org. Then forward suspicious emails or screenshots of suspicious texts to that address. Or, call the institution's

fraud prevention hot line.

• Contact the Federal Government's Consumer Financial Protection Bureau (CFPB) at https://www.consumerfinance.gov/consumer-tools/ fraud/ to report scams or for more information.

Editor's note: be skeptical; if in doubt, ask ... ask your financial institution. Don't assume anything.

Document Shredding Information

- Personal documents for shredding are accepted at no cost. Please place these items in paper grocery bags or boxes ONLY.
 - All other containers will be handed back to the citizen.
- Each citizen is limited to two full boxes (10"x13"x18")
 OR three full paper grocery bags.
 - Please remove all paperclips, binder clips, 3ring binders, bound books, metal spirals in notebooks, file folders, plastic sleeves, etc. Personal documents only!

Electronics Recycling Information

Electronics that are accepted free of charge:



- Monitors
- Computers
- Printers
- Computer Peripherals
- Audio/Stereo Equipment
- VCRs
- DVD Players
- Video Cameras
- Phones
- Facsimiles
- Copy Machines
- Wireless Devices
- Video Game Consoles
- Kitchen Appliances

Costs for certain electronics:

CRT TVs, 27 inches or less: \$25 CRT TVs, 28 inches or more: \$35

LCD TVs, 46 inches or less: **\$20** LCD TVs, 47 inches or more: **\$30**

Projection TVs: \$30

Items that are NOT accepted:

Compact fluorescent light bulbs, refrigerators, dehumidifiers, AC units, and other items such as clothing or batteries that are not considered an electronic.

NOTE: <u>Do not</u> place electronic items in the bags or boxes with your shredding items. This will jam the machines. Electronics recycling is separate from the document shredding.




