A Message from Pastor TaeWon

G race and Peace to you all! I am thankful for the wonderful July and August with your warm welcome, prayers, and support. Thank you for all that you have done for me. Above all, I thank God Who is with us.

Through this pastoral message in the *Twig Bender*, I want to introduce you to, or remind you of, what United Methodism is. Three quotes from the life of John Wesley, who was the founder of the Methodist movement, may serve this purpose.

The 1st quote is "I felt my heart strangely warmed."

The 2nd one is "The world is my parish."

And, the 3rd is "The best of all is, God is with us."

These three may help us to see our life journey in Christ. Roughly speaking, the first quote lets us know that becoming a follower of Jesus Christ does not mean to be born from a mother's womb, but to be born again, that is, regenerated "from above "(John 3:1-3).



Rebirth/regeneration, however, is not the end of our faith journey. It's the beginning of our new life in Jesus Christ. It's the beginning of our spiritual journey toward Christian perfection. In other words, repentance, justification, rebirth, and assurance of salvation mean that believers begin their spiritual journey on Earth toward becoming Christ-like.

The Apostle Paul wrote in Ephesians 4:15: "But speaking the

Two of those projects are the BackPack program and providing school supplies to those in need.

Henrico County schools for over 13 years. The Attic's support has grown by leaps and bounds since it began. At the inception, Attic volunteers bought the food, packed the bags, and delivered them to local elementary schools and fed less than 10 children.

During the 2022-2023 school year, Aggie's Attic provided over \$23,000 in funding to feed 120 pre-school and school children. A paper grocery bag (discretion is important) is sent home with the students that suffer from food



insecurity. The bags contain enough food for Saturday and Sunday as many food insecure children simply don't eat if they are not in

truth in love, we must grow in every way into him who is the head, into Christ." We United Methodists remember that John Wesley more passionately advanced into Jesus Christ and people since his Aldersgate experience, that is, his "heart-warmed experience." Before that experience, when he faced the storm on the voyage to Savanah, in the Colony of Georgia, he was afraid of dying, that is, losing his own life. However, after the Aldersgate experience, he did not have any fear of losing his life. Rather, he came to have more compassion for people in need. He fully opened himself for God to fully use him for people in need. He preached outside the church such as in a marketplace, a mining town, and so on.

The church of England did not allow this. Therefore, John Wesley was excluded from the appointment and pulpit. However, he did not quit his steps toward helping people. He never quit delivering the good news of Jesus Christ to people.

When he was excluded from the appointment and pulpit by the church law, John Wesley stated, "The world is my parish." He advanced beyond church walls to people in his days. In other words, John Wesley did his best to make himself nothing, while letting Jesus Christ be everything. He very thoroughly took his

faith journey in Jesus Christ, for Jesus Christ, and toward Jesus Christ. Therefore, his entire life proved God's everlasting presence. This is why he said, "The best of all is, God is with us" when he was dying.

For John Wesley, conversion and journey, and conviction and confession are bound to one another.

The three quotes from the life of John Wesley are inscribed on his statue in Savanah, Georgia. Whenever I visit the statue, I change the quotes into reflection questions to examine myself. I encourage you to do the same as follows.

1) Is my heart strangely warmed by the power of the Holy Spirit?

2) Is my mission field the world – meaning all lives that need the Good News of Jesus Christ?

3) Is my whole being rejoicing that the best of all is that God is with us?

My brothers and sisters in Christ, John Wesley's quotes



tell us about who we are and what we shall be. The first quote tells us about the starting line, where we shall begin, while the second one teaches us about our spiritual journey in Christ Jesus. Our spiritual journey has nothing that can be named a border. Like Jesus traveled to all people and all places and included all in God's love, we United Methodists have to take the same in faith and action. By doing so, the third quote "Best of all is that God is with us" will be proved through fruits from our spiritual journey.

Do not forget that these stages are not separable from one another. Without repentance, justification, and rebirth, we believers cannot begin our spiritual journey. We may not see God's vision and mission that is hidden in the quote "The world is my parish." In other words, without conversion and journey, we cannot arrive at the conviction and confession that "the best of all is that God is with us."

I encourage you to continue to reflect on your faith and life journey in Jesus Christ through these three quotes from John Wesley. Let us never stop progressing toward people and Jesus Christ.

I believe that many blessings are promised to you. Amen.
